Spanish speaking Latinos

- Latinos currently make up 16% of American Adults
 - 35% of California's adult population
- Many of these Latinos speak both English and Spanish, but...
 - Just 1 in 4 American and California Latinos 5 and older ONLY speak English
 - Among Latinos:

Speak English	California	United States
Very well	42%	41%
Well	12	13
Not well or not at all	19	18



Spanish speaking Latinos in PPIC Surveys

- The Statewide Survey has always interviewed in Spanish
- Interviews are conducted in English and Spanish according to respondents' preferences
- The share of Latinos choosing to take the survey in Spanish has fluctuated over time and over the last decade the share has declined
- In 2019 59% of Latino respondents took the survey in Spanish...
- However, once the data is weighted its about 50/50 as it has been in most recent years



Research questions

- How different are Latinos who take our surveys in English vs. Spanish?
- What would our findings among Latinos look like if we didn't interview in Spanish?
- What would our overall findings look like if we didn't interview in Spanish?
- Are there types of questions where the impact is more substantial?
- Is there any impact on polling election issues





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

Spanish language respondents and likely voters

- Among Latinos who take our surveys in Spanish 20% are registered voters and just 10% are likely voters
- Looking at views on the two major parties and the party system, Latinos taking the survey in Spanish view the Democratic Party more favorable and say parties are doing an adequate job
