About the Late November 2019 *Berkeley IGS Poll*

- **Auspices:** Conducted by the Institute of Governmental Studies (IGS) at the University of California, Berkeley. Survey results posted at <https://igs.berkeley.edu/igs-poll/berkeley-igs-poll>.
- **Data collection period:** November 21-26, 2019.
- **Sample size:** 3,482 California registered voters, of whom 1,694 were considered likely voters in the state's March 2020 Democratic primary for president.
- **Languages:** English and Spanish.
- **Method of data collection:** Online by distributing email invitations to voters, with a link to the IGS website, where the survey questionnaire was housed.
- **Sample source:** Voters randomly selected from the state's voter registration rolls.
- **Sample stratification:** Because response rates to emails vary across demographic segments, to obtain a proper balance of responses the sample was stratified with more invitations sent to lower responding voter segments and fewer sent to higher responding segments.
- **Weighting:** The results were weighted to align the sample to population characteristics of California registered voters.




Should Kamala Harris Continue her Campaign for President or Suspend it and Return to her Duties as U.S. Senator?

(among likely voters in California's Democratic presidential primary)




California Registered Voter Views of the House of Representatives' Decision to Conduct an Impeachment Inquiry into President Trump



California Registered Voter Views of the Fairness of the House Impeachment Inquiry into President Trump's Dealings with the Ukraine Government




California Registered Voter Views About What the House of Representatives Should Do About Impeaching President Trump
