Research Questions

- ❖ Will people rate outgroup politicians as more responsible for violence than ingroup politicians?
- ❖ Will this polarization be mitigated if people answer questions about the other politician first?
- ❖ Will this polarization be mitigated if people affirm relevant general principles before making specific judgments?
- ❖ Will answering questions about specific politicians affect more general questions about the issue?



Study 1 Politician Materials

In his official speeches, Barack Obama often paints police officers in a negative light: questioning their judgment, implying dangerousness in their culture, and emphasizing the role they play in violent attacks on African-Americans. Some people believe that this kind of speech is dangerous because it has the potential to incite anti-Police violence.

To what extent do you think Barack Obama's comments about police officers have the potential to incite anti-police violence?

o Not at all likely --- Extremely likely

If someone commits violence against police officers after listening to Barack Obama's speeches, how responsible do you think Obama is for it?

o Not at all responsible --- Extremely responsible

In his campaign speeches, Donald Trump often paints Muslims in a negative light: questioning their patriotism, implying dangerousness in their religion, and emphasizing the role they play in violent terrorist attacks. Some people believe that this kind of speech is dangerous because it has the potential to incite anti-Muslim violence.


To what extent do you think Donald Trump's comments about Muslims have the potential to incite anti-Muslim violence?

o Not at all likely --- Extremely likely

If someone commits violence against Muslims after listening to Donald Trump's speeches, how responsible do you think Donald Trump is for it?


o Not at all responsible --- Extremely responsible

Study 1 Polarization Results




3-way mixed ANOVA interaction between party, politician, and order: $F(2,741)=280.01, p<.001$

Study 2 Design




Study 2 Polarization Results




Interaction between party, politician, and order: $F(2,835)=222.18, p<.001$; no effect of introductory questions: $F(2,835)=0.114, p=.892$

Study 2 General Principle Results




Main effect of general question location on composite rating: $F(1,831)=4.939, p=.027$




Study 3 Polarization Results




Interaction between party, politician, and order: $F(2,800)=366.81, p<.001$

General Principles Questions Slightly Increase Politician Rating Consistency



Main effect of general question placement on within-subject consistency in ratings: $F(2,803)=4.805, p=.008$

Some General Principle Questions Varied by Location



Interaction between party and general question placement: $F(6,792)=4.103, p<.001$

Research Questions Answered



Will people rate outgroup politicians as more responsible for violence than ingroup politicians?



Will this polarization be mitigated if people answer questions about the other politician first?



Will this polarization be mitigated if people affirm relevant general principles before making political ratings?



Will answering questions about politicians affect more general questions about the issue?

Future Directions

- ❖ Further investigation into when affirming general principles impacts subsequent judgments
 - ❖ Moderators and mechanisms
