Why Focus on Suburbs?



Suburbs: The Growing Demographic

- Around 175 million Americans live in American suburbs and small metropolitan areas.
- American suburbs have experienced a 16% increase in population since 2000.
- This population increase is equally divided between domestic migration and international migration.
- Even using the most narrow of definitions, around half of voters live in suburban areas.



"We all know that 'suburban' means White, right?"

Demographic Profile of the Suburbs

65% white
10% black
17% Hispanic

56% are married

29% have college degree

89% are covered by health insurance,
57% have ESI coverage and 8% have Medicaid

\$64,144 is the household median income

53% describe their health as either “excellent” or “very good”



13% are white evangelical Protestant

How do surveys define the “suburbs”?



The Nebulous Suburbia

- In 2017 KFF/Washington Post Survey of Rural America, 32% of those living in the suburbs said they considered the area where they live to be suburban (14% called it rural, 34% said it was small town, 19% called it urban).
- 41% of people living in urban areas called the area where they live suburban.
- Cities are easy to define for researchers...rural and suburbs are not.
- The Census Bureau's Geographic Areas Reference Manual contains zero references to American suburbs.





2016 Election Preference (RVs)



















2018 ACA Favorability


■ Favorable


The role of suburbia in 2018



The Narratives of the 2018 Election

- Health care was the most important issue in the election. This was largely driven by Democrats and independents, not by Republicans.
- The suburbs largely supported Democratic candidates running in their districts.
- Suburbs supported President Trump in 2016, but flipped and supported Democrats in 2018.


2018 Election Data (RVs)- Share Who Say Health Care Is Very Important to Vote


2018 Election Data (RVs)- Share Who Say Health Care Is Very Important to Vote by Party Identification


2018 Election Preference (RVs)

Important Things to Watch for 2020

- Election outcomes are strongly connected to population density with rural areas now reliably Republican and urban areas are overwhelmingly Democratic.
- The decisions made by researchers when deciding whom to categorize into USR groups have direct implications for the narrative.
- Always asking the question - What do pollsters, campaign surrogates, and the media mean when they talk about the “suburbs”?
