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 Does the public have a different view of national security whistleblowing than it does towards whistleblowing in other areas of government?

Secrecy in Government



"The disclosure by organization members (current or former) of illegal, immoral, or illegitimate practices under the control of their employers to persons or organizations who may be able to effect action."
---- (Marcia Miceli and Janet Near 2008)

- <u>Heroism and morality</u>: Whistleblowers as "ethical resisters" and "policy entrepreneurs" (Glazer and Glazer 1989)
- <u>Retaliation</u>: Whistleblowers as "broken people," often crushed by organizations they've exposed (Alford 2001)

The Method

- Comparative hypothetical scenario model, all scenarios based on real cases
- 4 cases of "Public" Whistleblowing
 - EPA Water Safety
 - FDIC Fraud prevention
 - FDA Drug Safety
 - NRC Nuclear Safety
- 2 cases of National Security Whistleblowing
 - Air Force Drone Operation
 - NSA Data Collection

Confirms the utility of the method
