









Population density and 2012 Presidential election results by county

National voter turnout rates among eligible voters, by nativity status. Native-born Hispanics lag naturalized citizens by over six percentage points, and blacks and whites by over 15 percentage points. (Pew Research Center)

Statistical model



Data

- Population scenarios from Texas OSD
- Pew data for eligibility and turnout numbers
- ANES Historical election data for voting patterns
- Correct for Voter ID law effects


Method

- Develop statistical model in R
- Run 1,000,000 Monte Carlo election scenarios
- Count the Democratic wins

Texas sings the blues




Probability of Texas blueness based on multiple migration scenarios




